#### **Thickness Planer**



A thickness planer is almost like a jointer in terms of structure and purpose, however, they are two different machines. The thickness planer has a different cutting mechanism than a jointer. It consists of 3 body parts, a cutter head, a flexible table and rollers. The body of the machine is capable of fitting flat wood chunks to make required cuts. Portable thickness planers have a fixed table, unlike the typical planers.

Thickness planers are used for flattening wood boards. The even thickness of the wood board is important for woodworking. That's why a thickness planer is used to cut off uneven sides and make them equal on both sides.

Starting the dust collector and running a board through the planer without attaching the hose will make a mess on the router table, floor, bench and other places.

The chances of this happening are better with wide stock and a deep cut.

#### **German Potato Pancakes**



1 small onion
1 pound or 450kg potatoes
1 medium sized egg
3 tablespoons flour
Pepper
Salt
Oil for frying

Grate (or use food processor) the onions and potatoes. Drain liquid off.

In a bowl, beat the egg, add grated onions, potatoes, flour, pepper and salt. Mix well.

Other options – add garlic and cheese.

Heat oil in a large frying pan over medium heat.

Using a ¼ cup measure, pour the mixture into the hot oil, flattening it to form a pancake shape.

Fry each pancake for about 3 minutes on each side or until golden brown.

Serve hot with your favourite toppings such as sour cream, yoghurt or apple sauce.


